Shepherd Park Picnic Set for Sept. 29—IF

The Shepherd Park picnic is returning after a five-year hiatus—if...Here's why there's an if, we got the date of Sunday, September 29 from our friends at East Rock Creek Village (ERCV).

They chose September 22 as their picnic date – and September 29 as the rain date. If ERCV's picnic happens on September 22 as planned, then the SPCA picnic is on! But if bad weather cancels ERCV's preferred date, then we'll have to wait until next year. Keep looking at the Shepherd Park listserv for details and updates.

If the weather holds for both days, our picnic will be at Picnic Area 24 at Rock Creek Park. Picnic hours are 3:30-6 pm. (Someone else reserved the early afternoon hours.) 
Ms. Senior DC Welcomes Shepherd Elementary Students

Meet the Candidates



Paula Edwards, 4A01

I am Paula Edwards, the incumbent ANC Commissioner for 4A01. The 2022-2024 cycle was my first term, where I learned that this volunteer job and full-time employment are not a good fit for me. Still, I discovered

how many dedicated public servants and private citizens are trying to improve our city despite structural challenges. I found that by working together, we can make changes. Against my better judgment, I am running again. If I am reelected, I will work to improve public safety for crime and traffic, facilitate trash collection and vermin control, replace lead pipes, and systematize the maintenance of public spaces during my next term.



Joan Hoyte, ANC 4A02

Three of my ANC 4A colleague Commissioners are not seeking reelection and, up until a week before the deadline for reelection registration, I was in that category.

I'm running for a second term to keep our community on its current improvement and growth trajectory. Because—despite the unrelenting toll that serving has taken on my work and personal life, and despite the aspersions of some neighbors who have had no qualms about informing me that I've failed to live up to their unreasonable expectations—most of you understand that this is a difficult/thankless/payless job and have thanked me for my various achievements: getting DDOT to lower traffic speed bumps and install other traffic calming devices; securing a settlement agreement with Champion Kitchen; blocking the relocation of the Juanita-Thornton-Shepherd-Park Public Library; delivering a \$3000 grant to the Shepherd Elementary School PTO for extracurricular education activities; agitating for the timely removal/collection





Preparing for Spring!

Prep your garden for next spring with these tips shared by two of this year's garden tour hosts.

From Kris Nelson: Divide and/or move perennials, and plant new trees and evergreens to give them time to establish. 2. Prune and deadhead flowering plants as needed. 3. Plant fall bulbs (tulips, daffodils, crocus) in late October for early spring color. 4. Dethatch, aerate, fertilize, and/or reseed your lawn. 5. Rake leaves and use them in flower beds to shelter beneficial insects.

From Liz Crafford: "Fall is the time to plant perennials, shrubs, and trees for next year! Your new plants will have settling time, lower temperatures, and more moisture than other times of the year. Growing healthy roots is the key to sustaining healthy plants in the spring. Also, native spring ephemeral plants provide wonderful aesthetics and much needed nutrition and pollination for insects and other wildlife. Is Our Library Saved? We Think So

The District budget for fiscal year 2025 includes a \$30 million commitment to a total rebuilding of the Juanita E. Thornton-Shepherd Park Library on its present site at 7420 Georgia. It'll be a few years before the initial spending begins on site planning and architects.

But it comes at the expense of a new library along Kennedy Street, NW — which is where DC Public Library wanted to move our branch. The budget contains \$2 million for land acquisition along Kennedy Street to provide library services as part of a multi-service concept. DCPL refused to spend the \$5 million it was allocated last year for precisely this purpose. And the new budget repealed the Ward 4 Libraries Act, which would have guaranteed the Shepherd Park Library's continued operation at its present site. The Friends of the Library will continue to critique DCPL's practices and priorities, since it's given our community ample reason to question what the agency's up to.

A 100th Birthday Wish Fulfilled: A Return to Shepherd Park

Through a bit of serendipity, my husband and I recently met Winona Flyzik, whose wish for her 100th birthday was to visit her childhood home, which happens to be our house on Jonquil Street.

Ms. Flyzik now lives at the Heatherwood Retirement Community in Burke, VA. Her birthday wish was granted by Heatherwood's Life Enrichment Director, Tabitha Purcell. On a very hot day in July, Ms. Purcell drove from Burke to Shepherd Park to drop off a note explaining that she thought one of Heatherwood's residents had grown up in our home.

As it happened, I had recently researched the past owners of our home (which is now easy to do on the DC Recorder of Deeds website with digitized records back to 1921; create a free account and then search at https://countyfusion4.kofiletech.us/).

I found that James and Margaret Bell were the original 1929 owners of our house. I also discovered that Dr. Bell lived in our home for 38 years until he died in 1967 and it was sold in 1968 by his two daughters, Virginia and Winona. As a result, I was quickly able to confirm ours was Ms. Flyzik's home and we set a date for her visit. Ms. Flyzik was delighted to see much of the home looking the same, and remembered the front porch and the fireplace.

As we looked over the original 1929 Breuninger sales brochure for Shepherd Park homes, she shared some childhood memories. She was five years old when she moved and recalled attending Shepherd Elementary, Paul Junior High and Roosevelt Senior High Schools (Coolidge Senior High School was just being built). Her mother gave her rides to school or she took the streetcar down Georgia Avenue. Her father was the president of Southeastern University. When asked the biggest change, Ms. Flyzik pointed to "all the big trees. It's so green now."





The Parks at Walter Reed More Neighbors, More Retail, More Fun!

The Parks at Walter Reed: had a summer of progress with more residences, retail, and amenities.

Residences. The number of new neighbors at The Parks at Walter Reed continued to climb, with The Vale (310 units), HELP USA, and Abrams units fully occupied. The Brooks (89 units) is sold out, the Aspen Square Townhomes are selling, and the Hartley is leasing its final units. The recently completed Clover and Renard are now leasing as well.

Marketplace Enhancements. New businesses opened on the Marketplace Plaza: DC Pop-Up, Charmery (a Baltimore-based ice cream shop), and District Dogs, and Livewell (a veterinarian) is opening soon. Construction is scheduled to begin on the McCuiston Group (pediatrician), Pere Wine Bar, Arts Plaza food and beverage concept, and Slice & Pie (pizza shop). Manicured green space, nviting seating, a cooling splash pad, and game equipment complement the retail space. Pool Update. At an August 19 meeting, DC Department of Parks and Recreation reported that the planning for an outdoor pool at Walter Reed is back on track. Challenges with utilities and easements have been resolved, and DPR expects to hold community meetings to finalize the pool design this fall, with construction to be begin in Summer 2026 and end in Summer 2027. The pool will be located along Aspen Street near the power plant, and DPR will renovate the historic small brick mechanics shop to be the pool house.

As reported by Paula Edwards via email from Captain Hallahan of the 4th District, below is the real story concerning the boarded windows at Target and Morris Miller.

"An individual, possibly having a mental health crisis, broke into the windows of the Target and the liquor store. He went into Silver Spring, where he destroyed more windows and was ultimately stopped and arrested by Maryland Police. I am not certain what other damage to businesses he caused, but our Detectives will follow up on these similar cases."

Commissioner Edwards also learned from the store manager that the broken glass is a special type that will take some time to replace.

As reported to Cynthia Prather by Target management on 8/30, no date has been set for when the windows will be replaced. "We want to make sure that it doesn't happen again," responded the manager.
