Recent Actions

Stop the Surge: Commissioners considered a resolution to support ending the Trump Administration "surge" on Washington, DC but did not pass it due to need for further discussion among the Commissioners.

Walter Reed Pool Work Stops: ANC Commissioners expressed disappointment at the stop work order of the indoor pool on the Walter Reed campus, which had been included in the original plans for the campus. As reported by the Department of General Services (DGS), the plans were halted due to historical issues, underground utilities, and a street culvert. Visit the DGS website for more information. (dgs.dc.gov/page/walter-reed-pool). Although DGS is looking at other options for an outdoor pool, they have not yet identified any feasible location.

Deposit or No Deposit: ANC Commissioners discussed a possible resolution for The DC Bottle Bill, formally the Recycling, Refund, and Litter Reduction Amendment Act of 2025. The bill introduced in January 2025 to establish a 10-cent deposit on beverage containers like bottles and cans in an effort to reduce litter and increase recycling rates in the city. Citing studies that show that these types of programs are not as effective unless

surrounding jurisdictions have similar programs, ANC 4A voted to submit a resolution to the DPR Committee asking that the council work with DC's neighboring jurisdictions to create a regional strategy.

Missing Trash Cans: Per constituent requests, ANC Commissioner Paula Edwards researched the disappearance of several public trash receptacles that were once at former bus stops along upper 16th Street. Findings: With bus stops removed, those spaces are no longer public spaces but now statutorily residential property, where public cans cannot be placed. It will likely take significant effort to have the cans returned.

ANC 4A Has Grant Money: After reviewing financial reports for FY 2025, ANC 4A learned that it has \$98,000 available for neighborhood grants, which will be carried over into FY 2026, beginning Oct 1. ANC 4A will be accepting applications now on October 7 and again at the November monthly meeting. Neighborhood groups are encouraged to apply! Yaw Darko: Delivering Every Day for You

Yaw Darko has been delivering newspapers for 18 years, including the last six in Shepherd Park. His "route" takes him from Walter Reed to the Maryland line, from Georgia Avenue to 16th Street.

When he started delivering here, he had 220 daily customers. By September 2024, the growth of online subscriptions had cut that to 170. After the *Washington Post* pulled a Kamala Harris endorsement from its editorial pages last October, Darko said he lost "a lot, a lot, a lot" of customers. That only accelerated when the Post nixed an editorial cartoon (which won a Pulitzer Prize) showing Post owner Jeff Bezos and other billionaire types bowing before an image of Donald Trump.

Today he has 125 daily and 225 Sunday customers.

Every day, Darko arrives at the newspaper warehouse on South Dakota Avenue NE near the Goodwill by 2 am (It'll move to White Oak by year's end.) He delivers the Post, the New York Times, the Washington Times, the Financial Times and USA Today. On Sundays he shows up by 12:30 am to start his work.

This year, the Post raised the price of the daily paper from \$3 to \$4, and the Sunday paper from \$5 to \$6. Last year, the *New York Times* upped the home-delivery charge of its Sunday paper – cover price \$6 – to \$20. But Darko doesn't get a cut of that. In fact, he was stunned to hear the Sunday Times' price. As an "independent contractor," he gets a set price to start spreadin' the news.

Most days, he's on his route before 4 am, as the Post wants its papers on people's porches by 6 am (8 am Sundays). If you hear conversation before the thwack of the newspaper against your door, Darko's likely talking to family and friends in his native Ghana. He spent a month and a half this year visiting them; two years ago, he spent three months there.

If you think Darko's day is done before most others' begins, think again. When he's finished delivering, he drives to Baltimore to put in a 12-hour shift doing home care. When does he sleep? "Tell me about it!" he laughed.

In Memoriam: Dolores Hill Bondurant Local Crime Data Available Online

On March 3, 2025, Shepherd Park lost longtime neighbor, Dolores Hill Bondurant, who passed away at the age of 92. A 60year Shepherd Park resident, Dolores cared deeply about her community, serving as Shepherd Park Citizens Association treasurer from 2002-2004 and volunteering during Ward 4 elections.



Born in Richmond, VA, she moved to the Bronx, NY, before attending Morgan State College, where she joined Delta Sigma Theta sorority and met her future husband, Frank Bondurant. Her passion for the French language led her to study at the College of Saint Catherine in Rennes, France, and complete graduate studies at Iowa State University and Howard University. She taught French for 30 years at the University of Maryland, College Park, where she helped establish The Language House, an immersive language dormitory, serving as its director from 1991 to 1998. After retiring, Dolores remained engaged in language and culture, meeting former colleagues and friends on Saturdays at Kefa Café in Silver Spring to converse in French.

She is survived by her beloved husband, Frank, and devoted daughter, Alison. She was predeceased by her cherished son, Frank Jr.



At September's Citizens Advisory Council (CAC) meeting, the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) reintroduced Crime Cards, an interactive online resource developed by MPD and the Office of the Chief Technology Officer (OCTO) that allows residents to track, via "hot maps," crime throughout the city by type, location, date, and other factors. Colorful maps and graphs provide data visualizations of occurrences and trends across all eight wards. Residents can see today's statistics and compare it with occurrences one year earlier. Development Update: The Parks at Walter Reed

The Parks at Walter Reed continues to grow! While the community will miss Jinya Ramen Bar, which closed on September 14, the neighborhood can look forward to some exciting developments.

Hazel's Hardware

Hazel's Hardware, a 18,000 square foot True-Value Hardware store with a coffee shop, and office space is slated to open at The Parks in October, according to the Washington Informer. Hazel's, which is 100% minority owned, is named for Brigadier General Hazel-



Johnson Brown, the first Black female general in the Army. Gen. Brown was chief of the Army Nurse Corps, which was once housed in the place where Hazel's Hardware will be. The hardware store is projected to result in 33 new jobs, with two-thirds of the positions paying at or above a living wage and providing full fringe benefits, according to the Local Initiatives Support Corporation.

Howard University Emergency Department and Urgent Care

As presented in the Washington Business Journal and several community meetings, Howard University has selected to construct an emergency department and an urgent care center in Building 6 at the Parks at Walter Reed. Subject to regulatory approval, and with the support they hope to have from the community, they expect to open in the first half of 2028.

Juneberry Garage

Construction continues for Juneberry Garage's indoor space, which will feature a bar and cafe. In the meantime, we can continue to enjoy Juneberry from the Airstream (outdoor space), Thursday through Sunday.
